Andrew Earis - director



Andrew Earis is Director of Music at St Martin-in-the-Fields where he oversees the music programme at this busy London church. He is a graduate of the Royal College of Music and Imperial College, London, and holds a PhD from

the University of Manchester. Recent performances include Mozart's Mass in C Minor with the Academy of St Martin in the Fields and Beethoven *Mass in C* with Southbank Sinfonia. He has given organ recitals in venues including King's College Chapel, Cambridge, Westminster Cathedral, Westminster Abbey and Washington National Cathedral, and has performed as soloist in Poulenc's Organ Concerto and Saint-Saëns' Organ Symphony. In addition to his duties at St Martin's, Andrew is a regular contributor to BBC Radio's religious output as a producer of programmes including Radio 4's Sunday Worship and Radio 3's Choral Evensong.

Polina Sosnina – organ



Polina Sosnina is Associate Organist and Director of Children's Voices at St Martinin-the-Fields. She recently graduated with a distinction from the Royal College of Music, where she studied organ performance with

David Graham, Andy Dewar and improvisation with Sophie-Véronique Cauchefer-Choplin. Her studies were supported by the RCM Kenneth and Violet Scott Scholarship, the Organists Charitable Trust, Eric Thompson Trust and the Leonard Freestone Scholarship from the Royal College of Organists. After graduating from Magdalene College, Cambridge, Polina held organ scholarships at Temple Church and the London Oratory, and the Director of Music post at St Thomas of Canterbury Church, Brentwood. As a soloist, recent performances include recitals at Temple Church, Westminster Abbey and St John's Smith Square.



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
